




sorts sources by keywords, popularity, and how old it is.

Look at the url for each source to make sure it is reliable.

".edu" and ".gov" url's are more reliable than "org" or ".net". Wikipedia articles can be written and edited by anyone, making it an unreliable source. While using a library might not be as easy as Google or Wikipedia, it is a better source of true and relevant information.

Libraries have more than just bookshelves, but include a wide range of tools and resources including librarians that can help students find what they need. **Primary Source** - a picture, text, or any other source that was created at the time being researched


